# **CPS to Move Clubroom**

#### MEMBERS FOR FOR THE MOVE AT ANNUAL MEETING

The CPS Annual Meeting, led by president Vic Evcic, was held on March18th. Twenty five CPS members attended the meeting and voted on two issues. The first was a proposal to move the clubroom to the Broadview Heights location that the club has been considering for the past couple of months. The second issue was election of officers and board members for the 2005-2006 year.

After some discussion, a vote was taken on the move to Broadview Hts. Including proxy ballots, the vote was 32 to 1 in favor of the move. Details of the lease and approval by the Broadview Heights city council are pending, so the move is not yet guaranteed. CPS is leasing the current space on a month-tomonth basis as our five-year lease expired last year. Assuming the details are worked out and the lease is approved, CPS members will be able to design the layout of the space. The City of Broadview Hts. will then renovate it to our specifications. At the annual meeting, a committee was formed to work on various aspects of the move, including the design. The actual move could occur this summer.

As longtime member Joe Polevoi remarked, the vote for change of location was the single most important issue that CPS has had to consider in the past twenty years. We have been at the present location since 1984, and prior to that, CPS had been located on W. 6th street for about 35 years. Since it's inception in 1887, CPS has always been located in or close to downtown Cleveland. Staying within the city limits, however, was not something that most members have felt strongly about. CPS has served the Greater Cleveland

area for a long time and will continue to be a strong regional camera club.

After the vote for change of location, the annual meeting focused on elections for the upcoming year. A slate of officers and board members was proposed by the current board of trustees, and there were no other nominations. A vote was then taken and the slate of proposed officers and board members were elected unanimously. The officers are:

For those readers active with CPS, Ron Wilson needs no introduction. He has been a member of CPS for over 20 years, has been on the board of trustees for the past several years, has been the Pictorial Committe chairperson, serves as an instructor in our school, and is an outstanding photographer as evidenced by his many awards both within our club and in other competitions. Max Aynik and Jill Stanphill are relatively new members who have, within a short time, demonstrated a desire for CPS to thrive and a willingness to help contribute. Geoff Powers, as most readers know, is a longtime member and instructor in our school. This will be his second year as treasurer.

# Photo News

Adobe Systems, Incorporated has announced a major upgrade to its popular image editing software Photoshop CS. The upgrade, called Photoshop CS2, is expected to be available in May. Enhancements include the ability to scale and transform images without losing image quality, non-destructive editing, the creation and editing of 32-bit high-dynamic range images, a more powerful healing brush, new creativity tools, and new features to speed up workflows. Cost is expected to be \$599 for the full program and \$149 for the upgrade.

# The Keyword: Sharing

During the past era of film photography...does anyone remember?...a new print or slide film would be announced every few years. A slightly

different version of an ongoing camera model would surface. A few photo magazines would inform us of a new darkroom chemical and we would share the meager news with each other. Life was so simple. There were fine photos being produced but something had to change...something that would turn photographers into wild-eyed consumers with immense appetites for anything new, expensive and groundbreaking!

Fast forward to the present... in all my photo years there has never been anything like this before! Just about everyday I read about another new computer model, camera, scanner, printer, memory card, ink, paper or firmware...whatever. The advertising folks behind those "must have" items are enjoying their finest hours as they lure us to purchase the latest. Bookstores everywhere are stocked with more photo magazines and books than ever before. American and foreign publications cover every possible bit of information about new digital camera models and the latest photo-editing techniques. Add to that mix, countless internet photo sites with forums, ads, reviews and photo folks emailing each other throughout the world and the beat goes on!

This excitement has energized me to try keeping up with what is new out there. This is where I really enjoy SHARING more than ever with fellow members in my two camera clubs and friends on the

internet. The way things are going in this digital marathon, there is no way we will ever run out of stuff to talk about. As I have mentioned before, not being a "techie" makes things a bit more fuzzy. My routine usually follows this pattern... when I ask a simple question or bring up a topic...the "techies" proceed to dissect every bit of information possible. I move my head up and down and that encourages them to proceed into deeper areas of knowledge. This kind of exchange has been known to produce instant headaches for me.

With rare exceptions, seminars I have attended usually go down the same path. Hours of endless glimpses of new info on huge screens leave me in a blur, and later, what I did manage to understand

has faded away. Notes I scribbled in the dark are worthless, so I usually turn to some material like Photoshop books designed with very simple visual directions. The manuals included with equipment I have purchased are usually written in a manner most of us with normal IQ's cannot fathom. I get this mental picture of those writers rolling on the floor laughing as they create the "simple" instructions.

I think CPS will be more valuable than ever as we share what we have learned with more classes, competitions and programs designed to help anyone interested in this new exciting era of digital photography. We will not have problems bringing new members in when they realize how much we like to share our knowledge.



The Cleveland Photographic Society (CPS) was formed in 1887 and has operated continuously since that time, making it the second oldest camera club in uninterrupted operation in North America. We are one of only a few clubs in the country to have our own permanent clubroom and a darkroom. These facilities allow CPS to conduct a Photo School every Fall and Spring, featuring sessions on fundamentals, darkroom work and digital techniques.

Visitors are welcome to attend, at no charge, any scheduled meeting to learn more about our programs and competitions. Most meeting are on Friday evenings at 7:30 pm. We are located upstairs at 1549 Superior Avenue in downtown Cleveland, Ohio. The annual membership fee is \$45 for individuals, \$57 for couples, and \$35 for students.

In addition to programs and competitions, CPS sponsors special showings, workshops, and field trips to provide ideas, opportunities and inspiration. We also hold a number of social events and an annual auction.
